





BASIS FOR GRANTING ACCESS TO SDAP for incarcerated individuals in Colorado Municipal and County Jails: Under HRSA's HIV/AIDS Bureau Policy Notice 18-02 "State and federal prison systems are generally responsible for providing health care services to all individuals incarcerated in their facilities. Other correctional systems, such as local prisons and jails, may be responsible for providing health care services to all individuals incarcerated in their facilities, and those under community supervision may receive health care services by the program providing community supervision. The RWHAP statute, codified at title XXVI of the Public Health Service Act, stipulates that HRSA RWHAP funds may not be used "for any item or service to the extent that payment has been made, or can reasonably be expected to be made under . . . an insurance policy, or under any Federal or State health benefits program. . . . "

Under Colorado law CRS 17-26-104.5 county jail facilities are permitted to bill inmates and other detainees for the costs of services if they have a pre-existing condition that has been diagnosed prior to the time of incarceration.


















## Denver Health Correctional Care Referrals and Jail Case Coordinator












# Community Without Walls









### Successes

- Our team has successfully assisted over 1000 clients at the Denver County Jail and the Denver Detention Center in accessing necessary medications.
- Our program has evolved to include staff from correctional facilities outside the Denver Metro area in providing medication to their clients as well.
- Our goal is to ensure that every client leaves the facility with the medications they need.
- As the program has expanded, we have established partnerships with various healthcare providers throughout the state.
- Additionally, other programs within our Office of STI/HIV/VH have collaborated to offer additional testing and resources to individuals experiencing incarceration.



### **Lessons Learned**

- County correctional facilities vary in terms of the entities responsible for administering their healthcare systems.
- Each healthcare system has its own specific set of processes and procedures for medication administration.
- Not all entities are able to accept medications shipped from our contract pharmacy.
- Not all county sheriffs are receptive to participating in the program.
- Both external and internal staff members participating dedicate much time to coordinate medication shipments and determine eligibility.
