
Overview



Supports more than 90 programs that provide health care to people who are geographically isolated, economically or medically challenged



HRSA does this through grants and cooperative agreements to more than 3,000 awardees, including community and faith-based organizations, colleges and universities, hospitals, state, local, and tribal governments, and private entities







HRSA's HIV/AIDS Bureau Vision and Mission

Vision

Optimal HIV care and treatment for all to end the HIV epidemic in the U.S.

Mission

Provide leadership and resources to advance HIV care and treatment to improve health outcomes and reduce health disparities for people with HIV and affected communities.





HRSA's Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP) Overview

- Provides a comprehensive system of HIV primary medical care, medications, and essential support services for low-income people with HIV.
- Funds grants to states, cities, counties, and local community-based organizations to improve health outcome and reduce HIV transmission.
 - Recipients determine service delivery and funding priorities based on local needs and planning process.
- Provided services to over 566,000 people in 2022—more than half of all people with diagnosed HIV in the United States.
- 89.6% of RWHAP clients receiving HIV medical care were virally suppressed in 2022, exceeding national average of 65.1%ⁱ. This means they cannot sexually transmit HIV to their partners and can live longer and healthier lives.

Part C: Early Intervention Services (EIS) and Capacity Development FY 2024 Appropriation: \$209 Million

- Part C EIS funds grants to 355 recipients in 49 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands
 - Funds local, community-based organizations to provide comprehensive primary HIV medical care and support services in an outpatient setting for people with HIV community health centers, health departments, hospital clinics, and other community-based organizations
- All Part C EIS funds are awarded competitively every three years
 - Statutory preference given to areas with high rates of sexually transmitted diseases, tuberculosis, drug abuse, and hepatitis B and/or C
 - Statutory preference given to entities that provide primary care services in rural areas or to underserved populations
- Part C also funds Capacity Development grants, one-year grants that help organizations strengthen their infrastructure and capacity to develop, enhance, or expand access to high-quality HIV primary healthcare services for people with HIV in underserved or dural communities

Part D: Women, Infants, Children, and Youth FY 2024 Appropriation: \$78 Million

- Currently provides grants to 111 recipients in 39 states and Puerto Rico
 - Focuses on HIV care and treatment services for women, infants, children, and youth populations (WICY)
 - Funding may also be used to provide support services to people with HIV and their affected family members
 - All funds are awarded competitively every four years
- Part D also funds Supplemental Awards, one-year grant funding to help Part D recipients strengthen their infrastructure and capacity to develop, enhance, or expand access to high-quality HIV care for WICY







Part F: Dental Reimbursement & Community Based Dental Partnership Programs FY 2024 Appropriation: \$13.6 Million

Dental Reimbursement Program:

- Currently funds 47 Dental Reimbursement Programs in 17 states and Puerto Rico
- Funds are awarded competitively (annually)
- Expands access to oral health care for people with HIV while training additional dental and dental hygiene providers
- Provides reimbursements (36% of uncompensated expenditures between FY 2021-FY 2022) to dental schools, schools of dental hygiene, and post-doctoral dental education programs

Community Based Dental Partnership Program:

- Expands access to oral health care for people with HIV while training additional dental and dental hygiene providers
- Currently provides grants to 12 Community Based Dental Partnership Programs in 12 states
- Funds are awarded competitively every five years (next competitive cycle is FY 2028)
- Multi-partner collaborations between community-based dental clinics and dental/dental hygiene education programs to train and expand provider capacity






- In 2022, 566,846 clients (98.3% with HIV) received services from RWHAP-funded providers

 - 186,429 clients received services from RWHAP Part D funded programs






Number of Clients Receiving Services from Multiply-Funded RWHAP Provider Sites, RSR 2022

<1% of clients received services from a Part D funded only provider.





Viral Suppression among Populations served by RWHAP Part C Provider, 2022 RSR







RWHAP Part D Communities of Practice (CoP)

 Purpose: Facilitate the delivery of evidence-informed interventions and promising strategies to improve family-centered services to WICY with HIV in HRSA-funded RWHAP Part D provider organizations and HRSA-funded organizations serving similar populations.

The Communities of Practice will focus on three important areas:

- Pre-conception counseling, including sexual health (2023-2024)
- Trauma informed care (2024-2025)
- Youth transitioning from youth services to adult care (2025-2026)
- Contract Period: August 2022 July 2026
- Launched on March 29, 2023




