Reports are submitted in March of each year for the prior calendar year. Provides some data for specific regions, state, and EMAs/TGAs, as well as national data. Useful for comparing national and local data as part of planning. National Monitoring Standards	The National Monitoring Standards (NMS) were developed by HAB to help Part A and Part B recipient and subrecipients (providers) meet federal requirements for program and fiscal management, monitoring, and reporting. 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	<p>management and oversight based on federal law, regulations, policies, and guidance documents.” There are Universal Standards that cover both Part A and Part B, and separate Fiscal and Program Standards for the two parts. While meeting NMS is primarily a recipient responsibility, they have implications for Care Standards developed for individual service categories, so PC/Bs and PCS staff need to be familiar with them and able to refer to them in the context of Care Standards. <p>HHS Uniform Guidance: 45 CFR 75</p>	<p>The Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for HHS Awards, known as the Uniform Guidance, combines into a single document the administrative requirements, cost principles and audit requirements for awards by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). RWHAP recipients and subrecipients are required to follow these requirements, which have become part of the combined federal regulations (CFR). (There is also a Uniform Guidance for all Federal Awards, 2 CFR 200.) They went into effect on December 26, 2014. The requirements apply to all new federal awards after that date and to any pre-existing awards that receive additional funding. In addition, FQHCs help to enroll people into Medicaid and private insurance plans under the Affordable Care Act (ACA).</p>

LEAP Training Do-It-Yourself Kit – Houston

LEAP (Learning, Empowerment, Advocacy, Participation) is a “free 17-week training course for individuals infected with and affected by HIV to gain the knowledge and skills needed to help plan for the HIV prevention and care services provided in the Houston Area.” It prepares PLWH for membership on either the Houston Area HIV Services Ryan White Planning Council or the local HIV prevention community planning group. Hosted by the Planning Council’s Office of Support, it is described as “the most comprehensive advocacy training program in the nation

for HIV positive individuals.” The Planning Council posts information about the program, including links to the application and an informational brochure, on its website, at <http://www.rwpchouston.org/Project%20LEAP/Project%20LEAP.htm>.
