

Moving Beyond Data Completeness: Ensuring RSR Data Reflect Services Provided

#	Questions	Answers
1.	How many client level data files are we allowed to import client data from? Our agency uses two data systems.	<p>The RSR system will allow you to upload as many files as you need to, which is a common scenario if you're multiply funded.</p> <p>The system will merge files based on the encrypted unique client identifier (eUCI). You want to make sure that those IDs are going to be the same across your two or more files.</p>
2.	<p>My only question today is really regarding the upload completeness report and the check your XML feature.</p> <p>I noticed during the session that you stated there would be a change this year when providers will receive an error. Will you provide those changes that providers are going to have to follow?</p>	<p>There is a full list of all RSR validations and any changes from last year are highlighted. There is also an RSR in focus document that gives a high level summary of the validations.</p> <p>When you're submitting the Provider Report next year, you will have to click on the Upload Completeness Report (UCR) link. You will receive an error message if you try to Submit before clicking the UCR link.</p>
3.	Can you go over the reporting requirements again for federal poverty level, for the EHE?	<p>Appendix A in the RSR manual walks you through what's required for each service category. Federal Poverty Level (FPL) is required for clients who received certain services, including EHE Initiative Services. Services funded through an EHE grant follow the same reporting requirements, even though FPL is not required for EHE eligibility.</p> <p>If you're EHE funded and you don't know what you must report, just reach out to the DISQ team, and we're happy to have a conversation with you.</p>
4.	<p>I just had a question about the requirements for oral health providers.</p> <p>Do they have to report health insurance if they're only funded for oral health?</p>	<p>Yes, clients who are receiving oral health care are required to have health insurance reported. Refer to Appendix A in the RSR Instruction Manual to review what data elements are required by service category.</p>
