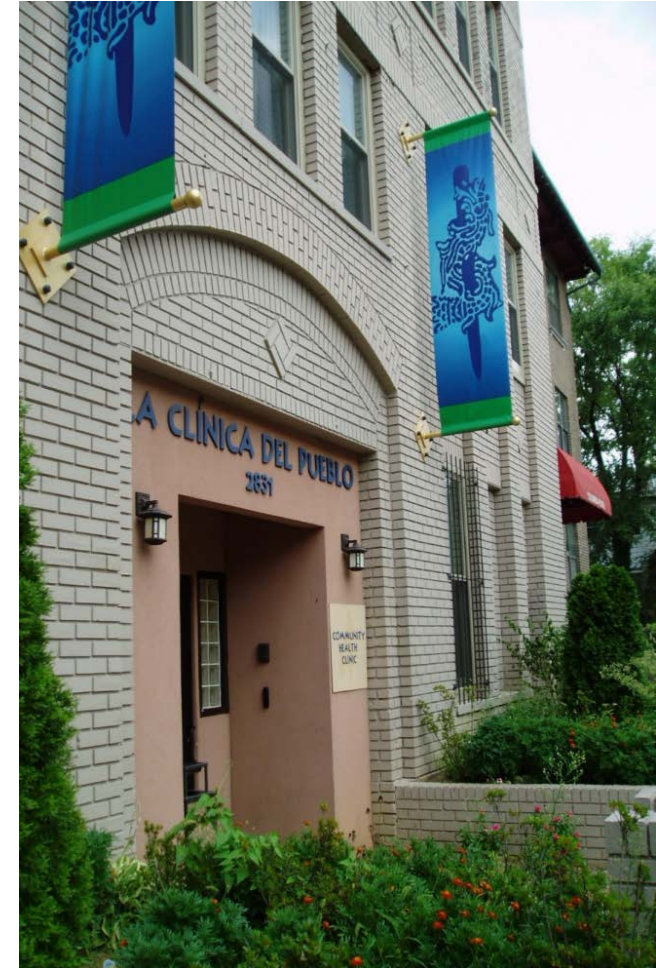
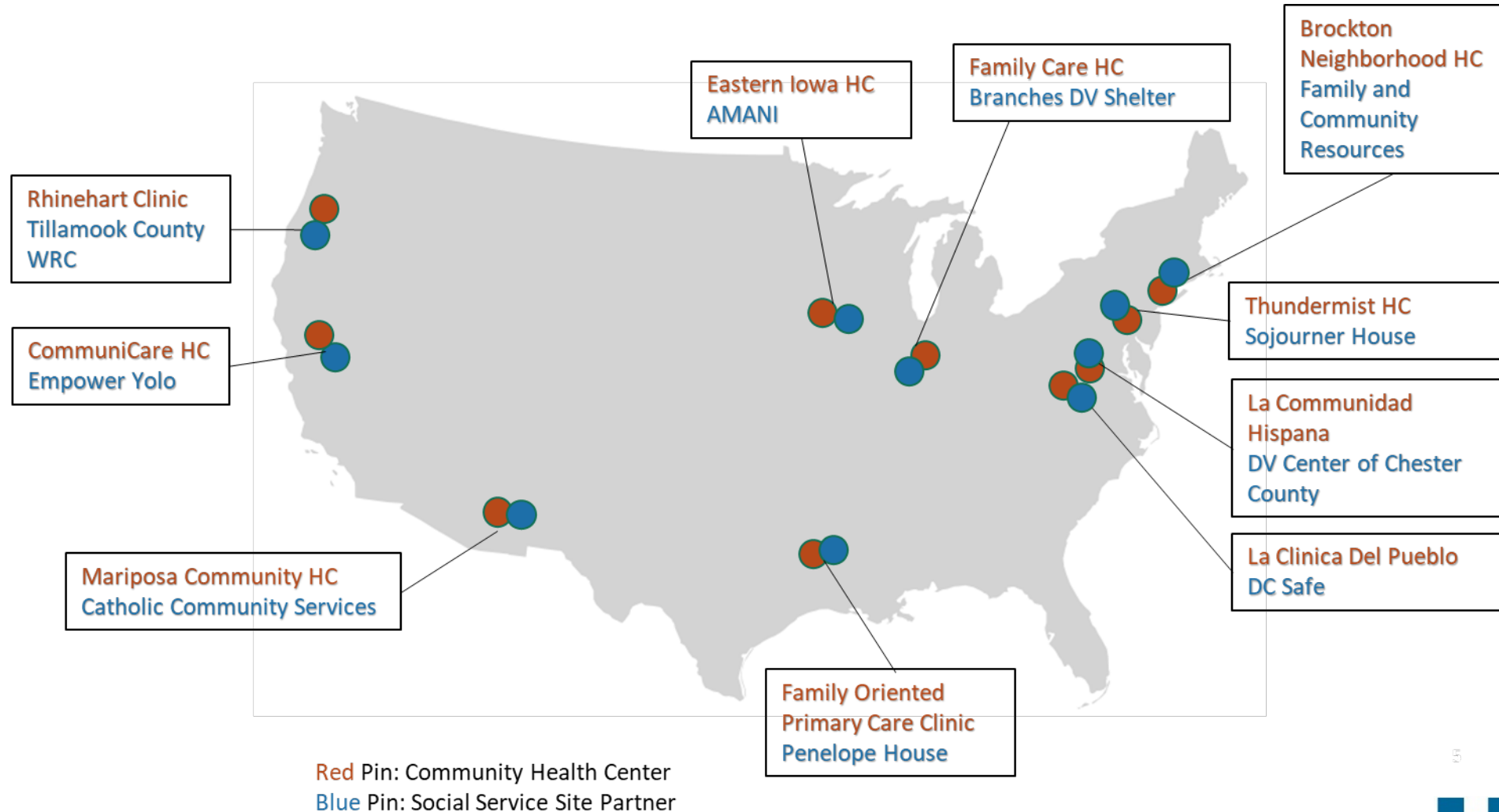

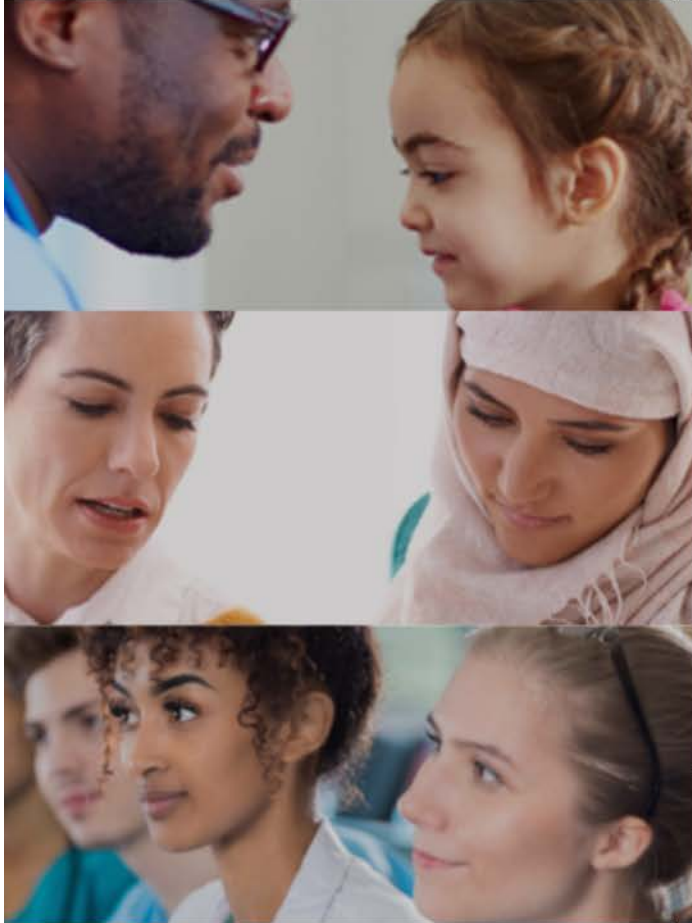
Health Center and Social Service Sites

Prepare your practice

by implementing a new or updated DV/SA policy to identify and respond to survivors in partnership with community based DV/SA programs, and promote prevention.

3

Adopt the evidence-based intervention

to educate all patients about the connection between IPV and their health and engage them in strategies to promote wellness and safety.

4

Train providers and all staff

on the impact of DV/SA on health outcomes, and how to assess and respond in collaboration with community-based DV/SA programs.

5

Evaluate and sustain your progress

as part of continuous quality improvement.

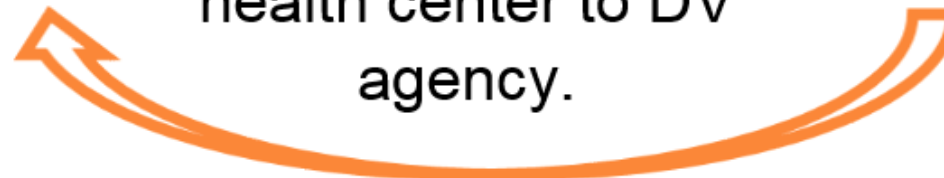
